The participating people learn about life-saving techniques to use in emergency situations that require medical attention when the ambulance or other responders may not get there fast enough. These students learn how to act immediately, implementing various strategies until a medical team arrives. These brave students are learning how they can aid in the rescue of someone's life!

In this specific program, the students acquire the skills to carry out the needed steps in saving one's life and protecting against serious injury. One of the seniors, Kristine Hall, who takes part in this class, explained that students are given the opportunity to ride in


the ambulance with the paramedic while an EMT (Emergency Medical Technician) drives to learn first hand what a real-life situation may look like.


